8 British Expressions Episode #5

1. **boot** (noun) (the trunk of a car)

Examples:

"I packed all our suitcases in the **boot** of the car for our holiday."

"Can you put the shopping bags in the **boot**?"

"Make sure to close the **boot** properly; we wouldn't want anything to fall out while we're driving."

2. **miffed** (adjective) (feeling annoyed or slightly offended)

Examples:

"After I spent ages cooking dinner, John only ate a few bites. I was quite miffed by it."

"I was really miffed when the bus left early and I had to wait an hour for the next one."

"Sarah seemed a bit miffed that no one noticed her new haircut during the meeting."

"He was miffed because they went to the football match without inviting him."

"I'm a bit miffed that my sister borrowed my car without asking first."

3. **doddle** *(noun)* (something very easy to do)

Examples:

"After years of practice, solving these puzzles is a **doddle** for me now."

"Compared to last year's marathon, this 5K run was an absolute doddle."

"When you know the shortcuts, navigating through the city centre is a **doddle**."

"The exam was a **doddle**; I finished with time to spare."

4. builder's tea (expression)

(a strong and often very sweet tea, traditionally the favourite of construction workers)

Examples:

"After a cold morning of gardening, I love to warm up with a mug of **builder's tea**."

"Could you make me a builder's tea? I need something strong to kick-start the day."

"At the café, they know me so well that they start preparing a **builder's tea** as soon as I walk in."

5. **gobsmacked** *(adjective)* (very surprised or shocked)

Examples:

"When he won the lottery, he was completely **gobsmacked** and couldn't speak for minutes."

"After the magician revealed his trick, the entire audience was gobsmacked."

"Seeing the surprise party her friends threw for her birthday left her utterly **gobsmacked**."

"I was gobsmacked when my favourite television show had a twist ending I never saw coming."

6. **sod's law** *(expression)* (when something goes wrong at the worst possible time)

Examples:

"You wait ages for a bus, and when it finally comes, two arrive at once - that's **sod's law** for you."

"The one day I forget my umbrella, it pours down with rain - it's sod's law!"

"I had to print my boarding pass and, sod's law, my printer ran out of ink just then!"

"It's sod's law that the teacher checks your homework on the day you forgot to do it!"

7. **spanner in the works** *(expression)* (a problem that prevents something from happening or working as planned)

Examples:

"We almost had the contract signed, but then the unexpected legal issues threw a **spanner in** the works"

"Just as we were about to launch the new website, a server problem put a **spanner in the works**."

"The party was going well until the music system broke down, which really threw a **spanner in the works**."

8. skive (verb)

(to avoid work or a duty by staying away or leaving without permission)

Examples:

"John is always looking for an excuse to **skive** off work."

"Despite having a report to finish, she decided to **skive** and spent the day at the beach instead."

"After lunch, half the class decided to **skive** the afternoon lecture and went to the park."

"Mum got really angry when she found out I'd tried to **skive** off cleaning my room by pushing everything under the bed."
